Leadership Hazleton class is close to finishing environmental education area

One of two community service projects being developed by the Leadership Hazleton Class of 2009-2010 is an environmental education area for Rails to Trails, Route 93, Hazleton.

Bob Skulsky executive director of the Greater Hazleton Civic Partnership, approached Pat Korb, executive director of Leadership Hazleton, with a request that the class develop this area which is located near the entrance to the Rails to Trails on Route 93.

Ten people in the class signed on and have been working on the project since September. The 10 class members and their Leadership Hazleton sponsors are: Michele Fisher, Mystic Yoga Studio and Commission on Economic Opportunity Scholarship; Dianne French, Greater Hazleton Association of Realtors; Tamara Huey, Valley Tutor and YWCA Scholarship; Nancy Mensinger, Leader Services; Heather Nenstiel, City of Hazleton; Al Onuschak, PPL; Jose Rodriguez, GHHA and Luzerne Foundation Scholarships; Tony Sandutch, Hazleton Area School District; Joan Slepiewski, Luzerne County Community College, and Nina Temchatin, PNC Bank.

Project facilitator is Skulsky Korb is project assistant.

The project will include five native grasses, Indian grass, little blue stem, switch grass, northern sea oats and wild rye.

"The original components of the plan provided on paper are still the same" explained Tony Sandutch. "We just had to rearrange some of these components to better fit the physical layout of the garden."

"For example, a water garden will be included, but will be planted in the current swale rather than trying to divert and rearrange the swale and it was decided that one pedestrian bridge instead of two would better accommodate the area," added Heather Nenstiel. "Interpretive signage and several rotating perennial plant areas for invited elementary students to plant, benches to relax and enjoy the garden, a fence and boulders, a walking trail within the area which will allow for wheelchairs etc. and a butterfly garden are still part of the plan."

"The whole team has been committed
